







The vision for the regional proposal is to support mentoring projects in four locations across the UK which have clear historical links with transatlantic slavery – one each in Scotland, the North of England, the South of England, and Wales. Each project will be linked with a local URC – possibly offering its building for use, as appropriate, but definitely holding the work in ongoing prayer. A further dimension would see the creation of one pioneering post in each location, hosted by the local URC, with the postholders embodying and further developing the link between the local church and the mentoring project. The aim is for the four postholders to collaborate with each other to form a
